- Lavender.



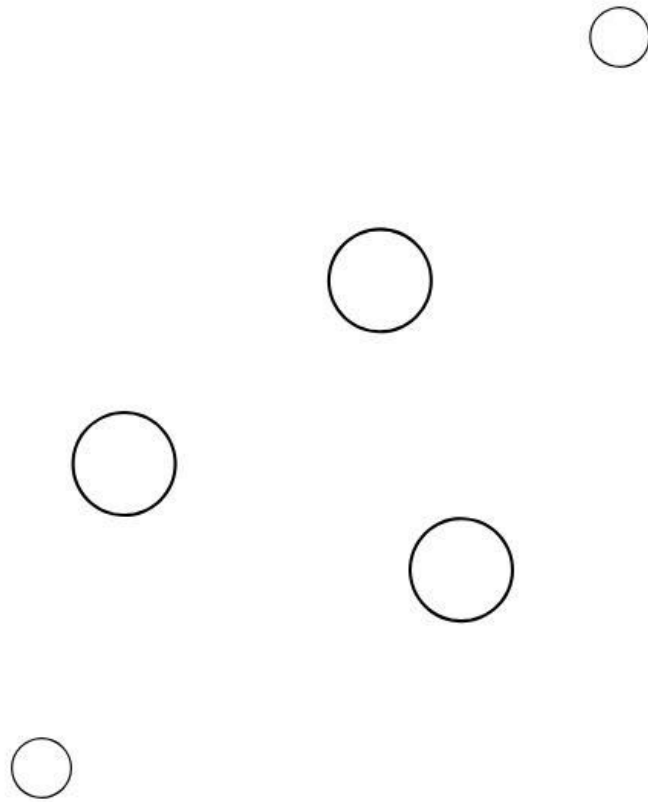
